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## Vintage aircraft chapter serving pancake breakfast

AUBURN — Vintage Aircraft Association Chapter 37, based at the DeKalb County Airport, will serve a pancake breakfast as part of the 25th annual Midwest Stinson Fly-In Sept. 19.

Members of the National Stinson Club and other pilots are expected to fly in for the breakfast, and the local Ford Cobra Club is expected to attend.

Breakfast will be served from 7-10:30 a.m. In the afternoon, Stinson owners will attend a maintenance forum.

The pilots of the Stinson aircraft attending the fly-in will visit local museums Saturday and Sunday.

E.L. Cord, owner of Auburn Automobile Co. in the 1920s and 1930s, also owned the Stinson Aircraft Co. for a time. The automobile company's headquarters, which now houses Auburn Cord Duesenberg Automobile Museum, once was used as a sales floor for Stinson airplanes in addition to cars.

## Vehicle struck trees; driver ejected

HOWE — Indiana Conservation Officer Robert Duff is investigating an off-road vehicle accident that occurred Saturday at approximately 10:20 p.m., according to the Indiana Conser-

vation Officers of the Indiana Department of Natural Resources.

Kelly Ray Williamson Jr., 38, of Howe was operating an all-terrain vehicle on private property

in the area of 5945 N. C.R. 250E when he struck a grove of small trees and was ejected from the machine.

Williamson was transported to Parkview Hospital in Fort Wayne by Samaritan helicopter for a severe laceration to his head. As of 8:45 a.m. Sunday, he was listed in

critical condition.

According to a Parkview Hospital spokeswoman, Williamson had been upgraded to serious condition as of Sunday evening.

Williamson was not wearing a helmet at the time of the accident, conservation officers said.

# Wilson: No second apology for outburst

WASHINGTON (AP) — One apology is enough, a digging-in-his heels Rep. Joe Wilson said Sunday, challenging Democratic leaders who want him to say on the House floor that he's sorry for yelling "You lie!" during President Barack Obama's health care speech to Congress.

The leadership plans to propose a resolution of disapproval this week if the South Carolina Republican doesn't publicly apologize to Congress. Such a measure would put lawmakers on the record as condemning those two words, uttered during last Wednesday's prime-time speech,

that have become a fundraising boon for the defiant Wilson and his

Democratic challenger.

Wilson said a resolution would show that Democrats simply wanted to play politics and divert attention from a health care overhaul that is lagging in Congress.

"I am not going to apologize again. I apologized to the president on Wednesday night. I was advised then that, 'Thank you, now let's get on to a civil discussion of the issues,'" Wilson said. "I've apologized one time. The apology was accepted by the president, by the vice president, who I know. I am not apologizing again."

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# Vaccines could start in weeks

## Swine flu shots may be available by first week of October

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nation's first round of swine flu shots could begin sooner than expected, with some vaccine available as early as the first week of October, Health and Human Services Secretary Kathleen Sebelius said Sunday.

Sebelius said she is confident the vaccine will be available early enough to beat the peak of the expected flu season this fall and that early doses are intended for health care workers and other high-priority groups.

"We're on track to have an ample supply rolling by the middle of October. But we may have some early vaccine as early as the first full week in October. We'll get the vaccine out the door as fast as it rolls off the production line," she told ABC's "This Week."

The possibility of early shots follows encouraging news from last week about the swine flu vaccine. Researchers have discovered that one dose instead of two could be enough for healthy adults, and protection could begin once vaccinated within 10 days instead of three weeks.

"That's great, which means we'll have a lot more vaccine," she said. "We also have seen a robust immune response within 10 days, instead of three weeks as was feared."
